




#### ANNUAL FALL CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS

The 2016 conference was a success we had 230 registered quests, 24 poster sessions and 14 sessions. This year (2016) we tried to decrease the amount of printing and paper utilized and therefore used "Survey Monkey" for the conference evaluation. There year there were 78 surveys completed whereas last year (2015) 74 surveys completed by paper. The demographics of those who completed the surveys were 59% OT, 18% OTA, 23% students; 64% have attended the MiOTA conference in past; 70% have attended the AOTA conference in the past; 40% of those attending have been practicing more than 11 years.

Chreston.




## AOTA Fieldwork Educator Certificate Program

# 2018 MOTEC Fieldwork Reservation Process Review

MOTEC uses a collaborative reservation request process for fieldwork placements each year.

On or after January 1st, 2017, all academic programs will have the opportunity to send out their Level II fieldwork requests for the entire 2018 calendar year. MOTEC is requesting that all fieldwork sites *hold their* responses for 2018 fieldwork placements until February 15th, 2017. MOTEC hopes that this reservation process will allow sites to view requests from all their academic program partners at the same time and distribute confirmed placements in an equitable manner. MOTEC also hopes that placements will be given to Michigan academic programs first, before granting placements to out-of-state schools.





















#### 2017 MiOTA Fall Message from the Leader

Greetings to all; as fall moves to winter and we wind down from a successful fall conference, one prevailing topic that appears hard to avoid is the recent election. While I acknowledge that there certainly is a wide and extreme range of emotions regarding this particular race and its outcomes, my intent is not to speak for that, but rather for what politically this may have in store for Occupational Therapy and consumers of Occupational Therapy.

I think most of us have known a health care colleague state they "went to school to be \_\_\_\_, not to push papers." On that same note, I think a lot of us may agree that they went to school to be occupational therapy practitioners, not politicians. Whether you love it or hate it, it is undeniable that what happens in healthcare policy impacting our reimbursement and practice is directly impacted by actions by politicians in Lansing and Washington, D.C. With the roll-out of the Affordable Health Care Act (ACA), also more commonly referred to as "Obamacare," during the Obama administration, a key provision impacting occupational therapy was coverage of habilitation services. Throughout the past several years, AOTA and MiOTA have been working at their respective federal and state levels to advocate for the role of occupational therapy and the definition of habilitative services. MiOTA has provided comment on proposed Essential Health Benefits for the state of Michigan advocating for occupational therapy services.

In the Trump administration's "contract with the American voter," repeal and replacement of Obamacare is listed as an agenda item for his first 100 days in office. It is unclear at this point what type of policy he will use to replace the ACA if it is repealed and what the impacts will be on healthcare and occupational therapy practice, and more recent analysts note that the ability to fully repeal Obamacare in that short of a period is unlikely, noting changes may not be until a year or two down the road. In addition, Trump has more recently hinted that he may keep some aspects of the ACA. However, whether we are ready to wear a politician hat or not, any time there are changes in policies such as this, it would behoove us as therapists to remain aware of what is happening and advocate at the federal level, which being a member of AOTA supports and being aware and advocate at a state level, which is what your membership in the Michigan Occupational Therapy Association helps you to do.

So, as we enter 2017 and foreseeable changes in state and federal policies, we will keep you updated on news to know whenever possible to keep you educated and informed, but also to let you know when we need you to use your voice to act, speak up, and advocate for Occupational Therapy Practice.
