2017 Fall Message from the Leader

\$6.86 & a penny of thoughts on social & professional responsibility

I generally prefer to be spending my time thanking those of you who are members; after all, if you are reading this, you are a member. However, many individuals commented to me after I spoke at the Fall Conference about this particular number, so I felt it worth sharing again.

What is the significance of \$6.86 you say? Well. First, it is very important to note that is a rough estimate. A dollar or two higher is probably more accurate; but let me explain how we came up with this. An estimate of the minimum amount of money each licensed OT and OTA in the state of Michigan would need to pay to support the cost of our lobbyist and office management firm. This is assuming the base cost of \$48,000/year for the services MHSA provide us (not including the fee for our webinar and teleconference service, mailings/postage, etc.) and assuming approximately 7,000 OT and OTA practitioners were all members of MiOTA. Now, that doesn't include our students, who MiOTA values very much, simply because we can find out from the State of Michigan website how many licensed OT and OTA's there are, but not how many students there are. So, to keep things simple, we used the licensed professionals to figure this number.

Now... using those same figures for the cost of MHSA's services at the base amount of \$48,000, but calculating the 354 OT and OTA's who are currently members (again, sorry to the students for leaving you out – but for this example, we needed to keep the numbers consistent when making a comparison to the previous figure) and the number jumps. To \$135.59 to be exact.

So, \$6.86 or \$135.59? Which would you rather pay? I certainly know which one I would choose! (hint – the one under \$10). Currently, our annual membership dues are somewhere in between those two numbers, although much closer to the higher number. I've had people approach me upset that MiOTA would use conferences to try to support MiOTA's existence. The mission and vision MiOTA was created for was not primarily to drive education; it was for

advocacy. I understand and certainly respect their concerns. Unfortunately, however, the need to support our continued existence as an organized group of professionals advocating for the specific cause of occupational therapy services in the state of Michigan, has demanded we think outside the box. We have made great strides in increasing tangible member benefits these past 10 years. Monthly webinars, activation of chapters throughout the state, a members-only section on the website to name only a few. Things that offset the fact that sometimes paying for a lobbyist to be meeting with legislators on the drop of a dime isn't as tangible as getting a little education time in the comfort of your home so that you can renew your certification without a lastminute course binge. Fall Conference is one of a few ways we have used to make up the gap between what an annual membership would really need to cost to keep the books in the black and what it costs.

There are two morals to this story

– the first – We are your voice –
but we can't be your voice unless
you lend us your voice as well.

The Mission and Vision update for
MiOTA is going on now. The first
survey was open to the members

for the month of October (it was on the website, shared at conference and e-blasted out) closed at the end of October. We have some good data and will be organizing meetings soon to discuss further. Keep an eye on your emails - make sure you participate - help us make this the best MiOTA we can make it. We can't leave the surveys open for indefinite periods of time or keep doing things over trying to get a larger sample. If it matters to you - please take the time to participate. That goes for elections, too. We had 6 people return ballots this fall. SIX. Since students can vote, as well as almost every other membership level... I really hope to see that number be much higher next year!!

The second moral – Membership Matters. You are reading this, so you are a member. Whether you are a student, new clinician, seasoned clinician, educator, associate, faculty, stay-at-home dad or mom who wants to go back to practicing someday, retired person, whomever.... you have given not only yourself, but all of us with you as members – and not with you as members the gift of advocacy. Advocacy to not only watch for and implement change for the better for our consumers, but also to watch for and to fight the kinds of change that will hurt our profession or consumers. Is it fair for 343 OT and OTA practitioners, as well as 246 students and 20 associate, honorary and retired members to be the sole supporters for nearly 7,000 licensed OT and OTA

practitioners in Michigan to receive the benefits of advocacy? Wouldn't it be great if everyone was a member of MiOTA, so that our annual dues were closer to the \$10 or less mark?

So, I want to empower you – I challenge you – find out who among your colleagues are members. Encourage them to join. We face some of our largest battles to come with the current trends in healthcare and healthcare reimbursement. Ask them if they will consider standing with you and our profession and being a member of MiOTA. Remember, if 75% of your department is a member, nominate yourself for an award at conference and you get a free CEU event just for your department - Grand Valley State University had 100% membership with their faculty this year!!! It's a simple thing that goes a long way!

Our voice is more powerful when we use it... and when we use it alongside our fellow professionals, we are more powerful yet. When the state tries to decide who deserves to receive the funding to provide services, would you rather we be the mouse in the corner or the lion at the front of the room?

Thank you, as always, for being a member of MiOTA.

If you are a member informing non-members of the threats and status of our profession in Michigan start encouraging non-members to join and be informed as well. Spotlight Member: Kathleen M. Kless MS, OTRL, CKTP

Way back in 1989, I initially went to college because that is what a high school graduate was supposed to do. While attending St. Bonaventure University in New York, a friend of a friend mentioned Occupational Therapy as a career. I decided to look up Occupational Therapy and I found my purpose: a career to combine science, psychology, arts and crafts- all in the purpose to help people of all ages. So, I transferred to D'Youville College in Buffalo, New York for a 5-year

entry-level Occupational Therapy degree. After graduation, my first job was at the VA in Allen Park working in the Nursing Home Care Unit and short stints in the Drug Abuse Program and Inpatient Rehab Units. Those first years were challenging to find a good mentor to develop professional skills. I would meet other new grads and we would commiserate about how we didn't really know what we were doing. In 1997, I left the VA and entered the Heartland Rehab System at Georgian Bloomfield. It was there that I found "seasoned" therapists who could help sharpen professional skills, learn how to navigate the Medicare world. It was there that I had my first Level Il student (I don't remember a thing about what I taught her). Through life circumstances, I came to Heartland Ann Arbor in 1999. 18 years in one facility will promote you to be the person who either knows everything, or needs to find out.

Over the years, I have had that desire to learn more, do better. Having the less-than-best learning at the beginning of my career and then being involved with others' learning, I challenged myself to continue learning. Over 23 years of "practicing", the more you learn the more you realize you don't know everything. Weekend seminars are expensive and take a lot of time from family. Recently I joined MiOTA (who can resist The Grand Hotel?). I should have been involved sooner. MiOTA makes it easy to keep learning- free webinars. There are opportunities to meet with

other professionals who have an unfamiliar perspective, a different specialty who are willing to share their knowledge. I also recently went to a free Fieldwork Educator day at Wayne State University sponsored through MiOTA. It was an enjoyable way to continue to sharpen my Clinical Instructor skills and know that I am not alone with tricky situations (and the lunch was phenomenal!). I am not really about politics, but it is nice to know that there are other people who DO like politics and they can negotiate those dark waters on my behalf. MiOTA puts your professional education within easy reach.

In hindsight, MiOTA should have been that tool I had in my pocket the whole time. How much more could I have learned the straightforward way? Who else could I have known to help me advance my knowledge, have a shoulder to cry on when I can't get the results I think I should have with that "one special patient"? And, although I don't like politics, should I have kept my head in the closet? Let's turn on the light and face the challenges to our profession as a unified group. We all know that Occupational Therapy is valuable, we make a difference. Let's be certain that others know.

One of the new requirements for Michigan OT/OTA licensure renewal is 20 hours of continuing education. One FREE way to obtain continuing education hours is fieldwork student supervision.

<u>Level I Fieldwork Supervision</u>: one hour, regardless of the

length of time of the Level I fieldwork experience

Level II Fieldwork Supervision: 8 hours for an OTA student (one hour per week of supervision) and 12 hours of an OT student (one hour per week of supervision)

Academic programs can provide a formal letter of supervision verification with the dates and facility name for the fieldwork educator's records. Requests for 2019 Level II Fieldwork placements will be sent to facilities by all MOTEC academic programs between January 1st -February 15th, 2018. the time and talent you share with all students. Below are a few tips and suggestions you could use to incorporate into your fieldwork education program. These suggestions are based from the transformative learning and adult education theories.

Ways to Foster Clinical Self-Reflection and Self-Knowledge: Ways to Ask Good Questions to the Adult Learner

- Be specific
- Move from the particular to the general
- Be conversational
- Avoid echoing the students' responses to a question
- Use follow-up questions or probes to encourage more specific responses
- Avoid close-ended auestions
- Ask questions that draw on the students' experiences and interests related to the topic

The Advocacy Report

The Michigan Legislature continues to be quiet, waiting for decisions to occur at the federal level. The Advocacy committee is weekly monitoring legislation that is being discussed in Lansing, to be aware of any proposals that can impact occupational therapy practice. All members of MiOTA have access to this legislative monitoring tool, on the MiOTA website, under the Advocacy tab. If a member finds an issue that concerns his or her practice, please bring it to the attention of the members of the Advocacy committee. We will investigate the issue further and provide the member with a response.

The Advocacy Committee has developed goals for upcoming year. The goals are as follows:

- Improve our Lansing Lobby Day event by meeting the following objectives
- Increase participation to a minimum of 80 OTs, OTAs, and students to the next Lansing lobby day.
- Increase lobbying meeting to represent 50% of Michigan districts or greater.
- Initiate training and materials for virtual Lansing Lobby day.
- Provide MiOTA chapters to relevant materials for lobbying in their legislators' home districts.
- 2) Develop a cohesive agenda for the three branches of advocacy (advocacy, public policy, and reimbursement)









3) Stay abreast of the advocacy, policy and reimbursement issues that are impacting the members through developing and responding to the results of a bi-annual survey of school-based, hospital-based, private-practice and home care MiOTA members.

4) Be a resource for members of MiOTA through updating the advocacy page of the website to remove outdated policies, communicate current advocacy efforts at state level the and links for occupational therapy issues that are occurring at the federal level.

After the fall conference, there have been four to five members who have expressed interest in helping support the goals of advocacy in Michigan. There is an advocacy meeting planned for 11/7/17 which will occur through the Go To Meeting platform, to divide the work into people's areas of interest and strengths. We are always open to having more volunteers to help us protect our profession and influence OT practice in the State of Michigan.

Planning is underway for Lobby Day 2018. More information will be forthcoming, as a date is set.

One other role of the advocacy committee it to attend bi-annual Tri-Alliance meetings. On November 1, 2017, representatives from the state associations met to discuss common issues for OT, PT, and SLP. Those who attended from MiOTA were Denise Justice and Lisa Johnson. From MPTA was Jakubiak Kovacek and from MSHA was Elaine Ledwon-Robinson. There was interprofessional discussion on LARA rules and regulation changes relative to continuing education requirements for pain (one hour every renewal cycle) and human trafficking (one unit per career) classes for all health professions.

The physical therapy representative discussed legislative policies that were impacting PT practice in Michigan. For example, nurse practitioners can now prescribe both SLP and PT. Occupational Therapy was already a treatment that nurse practitioner could prescribe. The MPTA is concerned with a bill that would limit that use of dry needling as a modality to solely in the scope of practice of acupuncturists. AOTA has put out a position paper related to OT and dry needling and may need to consider preserving the use of this modality for use by trained occupational therapists.

The MPTA is taking an active role in terms of Auto No-Fault legislation. Auto No-Fault Bill was introduced by Rep. Lana Theis, however, as of 10-30-17, there are not enough votes from the house to support this bill. To work on combating this proposal MPTA joined Coalition Protecting No-Fault (CPAN).

MPTA is working with EviCore via a payment committee to increase the ease of obtaining prior-authorization for PT services. If there are MiOTA members who are also having a challenge with reimbursement for OT services, please inform a member of the Advocacy Committee so advocacy action can occur.

Reimbursement challenges are not limited only to PT and OT. MSHA (Michigan Speech and Hearing Association) will be running into difficulty with Medicaid reimbursement soon. It was mentioned at the meeting that Medicaid is mandating that all providers must enroll in CHAMPS, which is not a problem for SLP who are part of an organization. For the sole practitioner SLP, the problem lies in the fact that there is not a provider category for SLP. There is a provider category for sole OT and PT practitioners to enroll, to be able to provide and to receive reimbursement for treatment of clients receiving Medicaid. One further concern that SLP's have been facing is that certain Medicaid providers have been setting the tone or standard for approval of therapy services which affects coverage from secondary insurances such as CSHS (Children's Special Health Services).

MPTA is also advocating to expand their scope of practice. They are actively attempting to be added to the list of providers that can write for handicapped accessible parking permits/plates. Driving rehabilitation is within the scope of practice of occupational therapy and advocating to have OT listed as a provider for handicapped accessible parking permits/plates in Michigan.

The MPTA representative also reports that the PT rules are being reviewed and a proposal is in place to extend their license renewal cycle from a 2 to 3-year span. They ensured speech and OT to consider this option at some time in the future.

One issue that all three disciplines have in common is the campaign against the Therapy Cap. AOTA is encouraging a letter-writing campaign to address the Therapy Cap. Another policy that impacts all three of the professions is proposed reduction for funding in the public schools for therapy.

Because of the Tri-Alliance meeting, MiOTA needs to consider possible action plans for:

- Auto No-Fault: should we join the CPAN
- Stance on dry needling
- Stance on OT's writing for handicap permits
- Education of Medicaid payers regarding therapy services

Exhibitor and Sponsor Eligibility: The MiOTA Fall Conference is open to exhibitors and sponsors whose products and services are directly related to the practice of occupational therapy. As space is limited, MiOTA reserves the right to decline applications for exhibit space and sponsorship from those companies or facilities whose product or service does not meet this criterion.

<u>Assignment of Space</u>: Exhibit location is assigned on a first-come first-serve basis as applications are received. Please notify us of preference for corner space. Note that corner spaces are priced differently as they allow presenters a slightly larger area.

Exhibit Security and Liability: Security staff will be available when the conference is not in session. MiOTA and Embassy Suites Hotel will not be liable to exhibitors for any loss or damage to property contained in their exhibits. Exhibitors shall be fully responsible to pay for any and all damages to property owned by Embassy Suites Hotel that results from an act or omission of the exhibitor. No open flames, animals or cooking allowed in the vendor area. Glitter and certain tapes should be avoided.

<u>Payments and Cancellations</u>: MiOTA will guarantee exhibit space and/or sponsorship as soon as payment is received.
