Friends of MiOTA The MIOTA PAC is Re-Activated by Jaclyn West-Frasier

MiOTA has determined that it would be in our best interest to reactivate the Michigan Occupational Therapy Political Action Committee (MOT PAC) which will be called "Friends of MiOTA". One of the important functions of MiOTA is to provide advocacy at the state level. Successful legislative work combines lobbying, grassroots advocacy, and political support. This process was successful in obtaining licensure for OT in the state of Michigan.

MOT PAC, Friends of MiOTA, was established in 1994 as an affiliated organization to MiOTA to help advance advocacy efforts by raising money to contribute to a political candidate or campaign at the state or local level. A PAC can raise the profile of MiOTA in the eyes of legislatures by demonstrating our commitment to participating in the political process. It gives MiOTA members a way to participate through contributions to the PAC. Financial contributions to "legislative champions" can help advance our advocacy efforts. As you know from recent emails from MiOTA, we are facing the possibility of losing our licensure because of recommendations from the Office of Regulatory Reinvention to deregulate OT in Michigan. It is time to reactivate our PAC to help us effectively advocate on the behalf of our profession and of those we serve. The reactivated MOT PAC, Friends of MiOTA, board has been formed with the following members: Jaclyn West-Frasier (treasurer/recorder), Deb Lindstrom (secretary), Tamara Gerber, Jacquelin Eckert, and Jody Thorton (Book keeper/MSHA representative). Paperwork has been filed with the state to allow for processing of financial contributions and a new bank account is being established to hold and disburse contributions. The Friends of MiOTA board will work to update the mission statement and goals and bylaws. Brett Marr, our lobbyist will help in this process. We will continue to provide updates as we move forward.

Advocacy Director Report by Denise Hoffman, MSOT, OTR/L MiOTA Executive Interim Advocacy Director

Dear MIOTA Members,

I am excited to serve as the interim Executive Advocacy Director for 2013 as we venture towards education and awareness of our profession among consumers and professionals. The advocacy committee includes reimbursement and public policy sub committees, headed by Nancy Krolikrowski and Laura Mills, which allows for a broader representation of the profession within legislation, with direct consumers, and among other professionals. It is rewarding to work with so many dedicated and passionate individuals who cohesively unite for our profession. Recent topics our committee has addressed includes: Capitol Hill Day, de – regulation, OT board rules and regulations proposed changes, the Autism Bill, and CPT approvals.

In October 2012, the new Autism Bill included occupational therapy as reimbursable for those consumers with non-self-funded private insurance. As the bill has unfolded, it is apparent the need for occupational therapy representation and advocacy. This was evident in March 2013, the bill passed an addendum expanding behavioral intervention but not occupational therapy services to consumers with Medicaid. A public comment statement was provided in June 2013 to the legislative offices expressing occupational therapy concerns. This is an ongoing advocacy topic, and I encourage those who are interested in this challenge to join the advocacy team or the Autism Alliance of Michigan to increase occupational therapy representation and advocacy for changes to include occupational therapy coverage in the bill for consumers with Medicaid and self-funded private insurance. The latest advocacy news is regarding the recent victory allowing independent providers the ability to bill the CPT code 92526, swallowing/oral dysfunction treatment for those consumers with BCBS insurance. Over 18 months ago the state recognized the "Independent Occupational Therapist "status which provided opportunities for private practice growth and reimbursement. However, with change there is always a learning curve which was demonstrated in the lack of consistency of CPT codes between facilities and individual providers. Therefore, it was rewarding to work with Nancy Krolikrowski, our BCBS Representative and Reimbursement Director, in getting BCBS to approve the CPT code 92526 effective May 1, 2013 for independent occupational therapists treating oral dysfunctions.

Quoting Maya Angelou, "I've learned that people will forget **what** you said, people will forget **what** you did, but people will not forget **how** you made them feel." Occupational therapy is that profession, making a difference how individuals feel through engagement in the most basic and simple daily task. It is our obligation to continually advocate for the unique opportunities occupational therapy exudes. Here are my recommendations for the top 3 ways to advocate: represent OT on a committee, write to your House of Representatives, and educate one new person every week on OT. Email me your ideas as well and we can post for all to use.

Capital Call to Action Hill Day by Laura E. Mills, MS, OTR

On May 21st, 2013, 77 Occupational Therapy practitioners and students gathered at the capital in Lansing, Michigan for the Michigan Occupational Therapy Association (MiOTA) Call to Action Hill Day. This event started by Bret Marr, lobbyist for MiOTA speaking to the attendees about the proposal of the de-regulation of Occupational Therapy in the state of Michigan. For more information about the de-regulation and the Office of Regulatory Reinvention (ORR) report refer to the MiOTA website (www.mi-ota.com). After the meetings, attendees were invited to speak with their representatives about the importance of occupational therapy services and the impact de-regulation could have to our profession. The afternoon ended with the Michigan Board of Occupational Therapists public hearing, where there were proposed changes to the rules and regulation related to our license. Nearly 70 students and clinicians attended the Capital Hill activities, and 3 individuals had the opportunity to present necessary information at the public hearing regarding the concerns about the proposed changes. Please visit the website for further information on OT public hearing. This is the time to advocate for your license within the state of Michigan. Consider contacting your state representative today. We hope to make Capitol Hill day an annual if not a biannual event so consider joining the next event if you missed these years' activities.

How often have you said to yourself "I wish I knew my functional anatomy better because there is something more going on in my patient? Or, how often have you said, I just need to figure out how to connect the dots in the upper extremity in order to provide the best evidence based therapeutic treatment program for my patient?" The hand SIS is excited to assist you is connecting the dots by bringing Dr. Scott Benjamin PT, DScPT to you this fall. Dr. Benjamin will assist us through this learning process by teaching in both a didactic and laboratory fashion on how to connect the dots.

Dr. Benjamin owns his own PT clinic in Michigan, has co-authored the book "A Cram Session in Functional Anatomy, a handbook for students and clinicians" (Slack Inc.) and is a nationally and internationally known speaker in manual therapy.

The conference is September 20th, and 21st at Ramada Inn in Lansing (see registration form) and is limited to 40 participants. Below is summarized list of course objectives:

- 1. Participants will be able to identify anatomy and biomechanics of the cervical spine, shoulder, elbow and wrist.
- 2. Participants will be able to discover those common cervical, shoulder, elbow and wrist dysfunctions that affect each other.
- 3. Participants will develop skills to assess when and how to mobilize the shoulder, elbow, wrist and cmc joint.
- 4. Participants will be able to perform differential diagnosis tests for cervical, elbow and wrist.
- 5. Participants will learn treatment strategies from the shoulder to the hand.
- 6. Participants will understand how wrist and elbow disorders can impact our client's ADL's.

With the Fall MiOTA meeting coming up sooner than most think, I would like to encourage everyone to consider nominating someone that they have known to have positively influenced them in their career be it currently or in the past. There are many worthy individuals out there that have not received the recognition for their efforts. Below are listed the various awards and the criteria for nomination. Please take the time to review the various awards and submit a nomination for an award this year. One important criterion is that the nominee be a current member of MiOTA.

1. OTR Award of Excellence: To honor members of MiOTA who have made an outstanding global contribution to the profession via encouraging the desire to contribute to the development and growth of the profession, focused public attention on the scope of OT, increased awareness of OT as a health provider and as a profession whose body of knowledge and skills are innovative in research and in implementation of new approaches to increasing quality of life.

2. COTA Award of Excellence: Highest Association award for a COTA to honor members of MiOTA who have made an outstanding global contribution to the advancement of occupational therapy via exemplifying the highest level of technical skills and knowledge that benefit the profession of occupational therapy. Shall have served as a leader within the profession and the health care community fostering growth and development of the profession and MiOTA.

3. Roster of Fellows: To recognize members of the MiOTA who, with their knowledge and expertise, during their career have made a significant contribution to the continuing education and professional development of members via utilizing special skills and/or knowledge in therapeutic practice, education, research, and/or administration. Both scholarly contribution and organizational leadership will be considered.

4. Distinguished Service Award: To honor a member of MiOTA for extraordinary service to the MiOTA. Nominee has made continuing and outstanding contributions to the development, growth and process of MiOTA.

5. Certificate of Appreciation: To express the appreciation of the MiOTA to members and non-members for extraordinary contributions to the advancement of OT. Their efforts could include, but are not limited to: financial contribution, political support, pioneer work, or outstanding leadership role.

6. Legislative Award: To recognize a member of MiOTA for significant contribution in promoting OT in the political arena via assuming an active role in training and organizing occupational therapists to impact on federal or state regulations and/or policies, educating legislators of other key government officials about the purpose and function of OT, responding to requests for action from the legislative committee of the MiOTA, acting as an advocate for consumers of health care and educational services, or playing an active role in state activities related to state PACs.

7. Departmental Membership: To actively support MiOTA participation by recognizing occupational therapy departments in which 80% or more of the staff are members of MiOTA.

8. Honorary Member Award: To recognize MiOTA members who have, or are, retiring, and who have performed distinguished service in the field of occupational therapy.

9. Master Clinician Award: To recognize members of MiOTA, who with their knowledge and expertise, have made a significant contribution to occupational therapy through a combination of some of the following: supervision of students and staff; articles and presentations; workshops; mentoring; education; therapeutic work with clients and families. This therapist stands head and shoulders above the crowd: a model for fellow therapists.
