

TRI-ALLIANCE MEETING

On Wednesday, 10/24/18 the "Tri-Alliance Committee" met. Those in attendance: MIOTA: Denise Justice and Jeannie Kunz; MPTA: Jake Jakubiak Kovacek; and MSHA: Elaine Ledwon-Robinson. The group discussed the following:

1. Legal Issues Impacting Professional Practice in Michigan

MPTA: SB 582 became Public Act 62 of 2018 (Governor signed on 3/13/18) with an Effective Date of 6/12/18. PTs may certify citizens for handicapped parking placards. MPTA website has information for members on the details of this new law. No operational issues reported at this time.

*MPTA sent the NY Times article and a copy of the OIG audit report that raised concerns on Medicare Advantage plans services and denials to BCBSM to help substantiate the burdens on the provider with eviCore.

*FEP billing guidelines for physical, speech and occupational therapy at skilled nursing facilities

*Health plan benefits for Federal Employee Program[®] members include physical, speech and

occupational therapy that's provided in a skilled nursing facility.

What you need to know when billing for this:

*The facility must bill each individual date of service,
*Services with a date range will cause the claim to reject and will delay the claim process.

*Visits will accumulate toward the physical therapy, speech therapy and occupational therapy maximum under the member's Standard or Basic Option coverage.

*The Standard Option visit maximum is 75 visits per person, per calendar year.

*The Basic Option visit maximum is 50 visits per person, per calendar year.

4. Rules Update from State of Michigan – LARA

Reminder: LARA informed MPTA that language stating that the professionals must provide continued care without regard to the provider's safety will be removed from all Rules as it superseded the statue.

Note: MPTA has been informed that LARA cannot support the move from a 2-year re-licensure cycle to a 3-year re-licensure cycle. No rationale given. Still seeking information.

Friends of OT in Michigan Call for Volunteer Leaders

Our Political Action Committee (PAC) needs to move "to the next level" to improve the conditions in MI for our clients/consumers/patients and the occupational therapists here in MI. Jackie Ryan (West-Frasier) and I "reactivated" the PAC in 2013 when OT was on the list of professions in Michigan that were recommended for having licensure removed. We have raised well over \$6,000 since that time, but we need to start the action of putting that money to work for us in the political system. Jackie and I agreed to do the bookwork and fund raising, but that isn't enough! We need to "pass the baton" on to others who can work closely with the MiOTA Advocacy Committee to actively watch candidates and fundraising events, so that we can use the money to move our professional issues forward in the state of MI! Jackie is the finance person, and will work with Jody

from the lobbyist's office and our new committee to be sure that we cross the "t: and dot the "I" and follow all the legal rules for a PAC. I will work with the committee to talk about the Silent Auction and other "asks" that we have made in the past. It is a worthwhile time commitment that is very low most of the time but then requires some bursts of time after conference to get the reports done in a timely manner. We have been very happy to play the role that we could this past 5 years and are ready to help others get to that "next level."

MOTEC MEMO November 2018

MOTEC (The Michigan Occupational Therapy Education Consortium) thanks all fieldwork educators for another wonderful year (2018) of student placements across the state of Michigan!

Fieldwork Educator Days:

MOTEC hosted three Fieldwork Educator days in 2018 titled: **Pathway To** Success in Fieldwork Education. During these courses, numerous fieldwork educators, form across the state, discussed the importance of highlighting the assessment and intervention of psychosocial and mental health factors in any practice setting during fieldwork experiences. Thank you to the numerous fieldwork educators who volunteered their time to speak on the psychosocial panels. The course also

focused on how to address student performance challenges. MOTEC will meet in early 2019 to plan the agenda and locations of the 2019 fieldwork educator days.

OTD Entry Point Mandate in Abeyance:

On Tuesday October 9th, 2018, all AOTA members received an email from AOTA with the following information:

- "In July 2018 the AOTA Board of Directors passed a resolution that the OTD and OTA mandates be placed in abeyance so that further investigation of issues related to the mandates be completed and recommendations be forwarded to the Representative Assembly for consideration."
- "ACOTE on September 27, 2018, accepted AOTA's abeyance of the 2027 mandate requiring all entry occupational therapy programs to transition to the doctoral level."

In October of 2018, the AOTA Board of Directors appointed a task force to

"determine external issues affecting entry level education" for OT and OTA. The task force includes members of the AOTA Board, the Representative Assembly, and ACOTE. The evidence and data collected by this task force will be shared with the Representative Assembly, who will have the final education entry point decision for both OT and OTA.

2018 ACOTE Standards

ACOTE is the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education. The 2018 **ACOTE Standards were** officially adopted in August 2018 and will be effective July 21st, 2020. To view the entire set of the 2018 ACOTE Standards, please visit the AOTA website. Accreditation section. The "C" section of the document lists the fieldwork standards for Level Land Level II Fieldwork. The most important changes to note are the following standards:

> C.1. 3 = <u>All</u> fieldwork experiences (Level I and Level II) will need a psychosocial

- **objective**, for all areas of practice.
- C.1.11 = Academic programs will need to verify the license number of all Level II Fieldwork Educators and the site-specific learning objectives of the experience, prior to the start of the rotation. OT/OTA fieldwork programs can no longer wait until day one/week one of a fieldwork experience for the fieldwork educator license number and site-specific objectives.

_A Tribute to Christian Rasmussen

Michigan Occupational Therapy Association wishes to extend its greatest sympathy to the family of Christian Rasmussen. After battling cancer for 2 years, he passed away on June 27, 2018.

Christian graduated with his master's in occupational therapy in 1977 from University of Buffalo. Christian worked in the field of occupational therapy since the late 80's. His career consisted of working at the University of Michigan in both hand and burn treatment. He then went on to work for Smith and Nephew-Roldan. Many of you may recall him visiting your clinic or attending a splint workshop.

Christian volunteered for MiOTA in several ways. He designed conference brochures, and in early 2000's, MiOTA had the honor of having him as a Key Note Speaker at our annual conference in Kalamazoo. His presentation included painting a mural of Mozart which was auctioned off. The owner of this painting is Fred Sammons and Barbara Rider. Christian also coined the theme for one of MiOTA's annual conferences: "Living Life to the Fullest".

Christian had a passion for helping people and for art. He lived his life in this manner in the truest sense as he had one final "happy hour" while in hospice at the hospital which included his favorite beverage, an "Old Fashion".

Some interesting facts about Christian:

- He was on the show "What's My Line", as a fire hydrant painter for the city of Dearborn.
- In the past, his artwork has been displayed during Art Prize in Grand Rapids
- His two sons wrote, directed, and produced a

short film based upon Christian's life called "Famous in Detroit, which won the <u>2018</u> <u>Cinetopia Audience</u> <u>Award</u> at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

Christian Rasmussen was an amazing individual who will truly be missed by all who knew him including the community of Occupational Therapy.
