I was introduced to OT as a child, receiving services through Easter Seals following casting for hip dysplasia, and decided on OT as a career when I was 16.

In my current practice, I work adolescents in occupation-centered makerspace at Warren Woods High School. Tower developed this program called "Make it work". A required woodworking course at Eastern Kentucky University ignited the spark I have today for making and creating in my practice. We use machine-based technology and traditional woodworking to create functional pieces of art using upcycled granite, quartz, Corian, fabric, and porcelain. Advocacy in Action

The Advocacy Committee has been busy this summer working on updates to the website, creating member surveys, and monitoring updates to Michigan's Medicaid Laws. We are monitoring updates and changes to several bills and crafting responses.

The State of Michigan has updated licensure requirements for all licensed Occupational Therapists in the state.
Therapists must have at least one Continuing Education course in Human Trafficking. Additionally, therapists must have yearly continuing education on Pain and Pain-Related Issues.

Payer-Driven Payment Models are upcoming changes to billing procedures that emphasize value versus volume. Many therapists who bill Medicaid while working in SNFs, home health agencies, inpatient rehabilitation facilities, and outpatient facilities will be experiencing shifts in payment models. "Specific" Soft Tissue Mobilization of the Upper Extremity

Course Description:

This course will employ didactic and lab learning in the study of "specific" soft tissue mobilization (SSTM) of the upper extremity. Participants will investigate the principles of "specific" soft tissue mobilization, the etiology and site identification of soft tissue pathology and the biomechanical properties of normal and abnormal soft tissue in relation to the healing phases of tissue. Equal time will be dedicated to discussion on the evidence, rationale, application and administration of soft tissue mobilization treatment techniques.

Learning Objectives:

- 1. Promote understanding of "specific" soft mobilization, the etiology and site identification of soft tissue pathology and the biomechanical properties of normal and abnormal soft tissue in relation to the healing phases of tissue.
- 2. Recognize and promote the value of personal and clinical collaborative work via labs centered on "specific" soft tissue upper extremity treatment techniques.
- 3. Differentiate between "specific" soft tissue mobilization techniques, anatomy and pathology of the shoulder, elbow, wrist and hand.
- 4. Build a network of colleagues in which to exchange ideas and contact information.
- 5. Integrate various media and modes of learning to the specific study of upper extremity soft tissue mobilization.
